# WE VOTE!!!!!!! - Celebrating 100 Years of Women's Suffrage through Quilts, Textiles and Traditional Women's Crafts

"We Vote!" is a celebration of the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of women winning the right to vote in Washington State, one of the first five states to do so in our country. This event will take place Saturday, May 8, 2010, 10 am to 4 pm, at the historic Schmidt House and grounds in Tumwater.

Who, I'm sure you are wondering, are some of the women who made this possible? Shanna Stevenson, Coordinator of the Women's History Consortium Project, spoke to our South Sound Quilt Study Group about local women who helped make women's suffrage happen. The group decided to find out more about these women, their lives and their activities. The natural result of our study was to plan a special celebration of "Women's Suffrage" one hundred years ago! So, we got busy, put our heads

## THURSTON COUNTY DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION

—From The Pioneer and Democrat, May 4, 1860

The undersigned, Democratic Central Committee for Thurston County, would respectfully recommend that a Democratic County Convention to nominate candidates to represent Thurston County in the next Legislature, and persons to fill the different

county offices elective this season, be held at the school house at Tum Water on Saturday the 9th day of June next.

The committee would recommend that each precinct send one delegate to said convention for every ten voters, and

that the primary meetings to choose delegates to the convention, be held in the different precincts, at the places hereinafter designated, at 7 o'clock, P.M., on Saturday, June 2d, 1860.

It fit and was in pretty good shape. The sweat band was embossed with the name of the original owner, Governor Clarence Martin. I had no idea who he was, but I wanted the hat and bout it on the spot.

The TMS Homesteaders will present their annual Pioneer Fair to Tumwater's 4th grade students on Thursday June 3 and Friday June 4 and to the public from 10 to 4 on Saturday, June 5. The Homesteader boys and girls will demonstrate the pioneer skills they've learned

# TUMWATER MAN IS SERIOUSLY HURT—W. ISAACSON INJURED

Injured Man Picked Up in One Part of Town and Horse in Another

William Isaacson of Tumwater was thrown from a light cart when his horse ran away last evening on Union street near the Northern Pacific trestle, and was severely injured, lying in the road for some time before he was found and taken to the hospital in an unconscious condition. At a late hour last evening he was reported to be resting easily, although badly shaken up, and with a bad wound on his head.

Just what caused the accident is not known. Ed McCarty

while going home heard some one groaning in the middle of the street and on investigating found Isaacson there in a semi-conscious condition. Shortly afterwards a telephone message called the police to upper Main street to stop a runaway horse, as it was feared some one had been hurt. McCarty carried Isaacson to the residence of Mr. Johnson and notified the police and called an ambulance. Chief Wright went at once to the Johnson home and accompanied Isaacson to the hospital.

In the meantime Night Officer Ignash had caught an auto-

mobile and hurried to upper Main street where he found the horse and what remained of a light cart tangled up with a telephone pole. One of the Schmidt boys had stopped the outfit. The horse was brought back to the city and left at a livery barn.

Isaacson was unable last evening to give a statement as to the cause of the runaway and it is not known. He is a married man and lives at Tumwater.

(Continued from page 2) I thought it would be fairly easy to research a Washington State Governor on the Internet, but much of the information on him was "ancient history" and not available on line. I found a minimum of information and was not satisfied. Governor Martin was Governor of Washington State from 1933 to 1942. He was the first person across the Tacoma's Narrows Bridge when it opened, poured the first bucket of concrete in the Grand Coulee Dam, was instrumental in developing the highways across the mountains, signed the laws that started the Liquor Control Board, Sales Tax and Business Occupation Tax and was inducted into the Lummi Indian Tribe. I found several pictures of him wearing a fedora hat, but I couldn't find a picture of him in his top hat. I then found information that his personal records were stored at Washington State University and that the football stadium was named after him. I determined that I would one day make a special trip to WSU and go through his files and see if I could find a photo of him in the hat. Last fall. I went to WSU and

spent an entire day going through his records. I found the check he wrote to the store where he bought his top hat, photos of him in a top hat and quite a few articles about him from newspapers and magazines. I never did find a receipt for a beaver top hat. One photo of Governor Martin in a top had ad a description written by the photographer calling his hat a silk top hat. I believe (but cannot prove) that this was an assumption on the part of the photographer.

The upshot of all this is that I have a beaver top hat with the name embossed on it says this is the governor's hat. I have copies of pictures, articles and historical information which shows him wearing a top hat. I have a booklet of

over 50 pages of "evidence" I have compiled trying to prove that this beaver hat is the actual hat in those photos. However, after all of this work, I still do not have absolute independent proof that this is his hat. But, I sure had a lot of fun researching all of this.

I think this proves just how difficult the search for truth in studying history really is. Any simple "historical fact" can be twisted or changed by one observer's incorrect statement or interpretation. Years later, a casual comment can radically alter how an event is viewed by researchers seeking to understand the attitudes and behaviors of our forebears. If searching out the truth regarding a 'silk' or "beaver" top hat is so difficult, how much more so is it to discover the actual attitudes or beliefs of people from an earlier time? The historian's responsibility is to record and report what actually occurred, not what we might like our history to reflect. The face of history covered with pimples, bumps and warts. Human history is not necessarily no-
